Happy New Year! As I'm writing this, we still have a little over a week to go in 2023, but I've already started designing the worship services into January, so I've started writing 2024. Can you believe the new year is almost here?

I'm not a fan of New Year's resolutions. For the most part, we drop them by the beginning of February if not before. However, a new year can be a good time to set some goals and begin to make some positive changes to achieve them.

I think 2024 will be a good time to focus on our growth as disciples of Jesus. Remember, the mission of Cross~Wind is to "Make disciples of Jesus Christ for the transformation of the world." It's easy to say that, but not always easy to do.

In 2024, I want to offer several opportunities to help us to grow from wherever we happen to be in our spiritual lives and take a few positive steps to grow a few steps closer to where we want to be in our relationship to God.

I'm thinking and praying about developing a Cross~Wind Way of Life—meaning having eight to ten simple, memorable phrases that we can all use to define what it means for us to live as disciples within the community of Cross~Wind United Methodist Church. You'll hear more about that as the year goes on.

I want to offer short term opportunities to give us practical steps we can make to grow closer to God.

The first of these is coming in January. "Life with God" is a nine-week small group experience to look at developing a balanced way to live a life of deeper connection with God. We're not bystanders in our spiritual lives; we're active participants with God, who is ever inviting us into relationship with him.

Jesus gave us a complete picture of God, and demonstrated how we can experience vitality and fullness in our life with God (Col. 2:9, Jn. 10:10). The historical Church (Christians), despite its divisions and differences, has upheld the core characteristics of Christ's life through what we now call traditions.

Taken together, these traditions help us envision a balanced spiritual life. They serve as a guide to help us take on the life of Jesus – to become like Jesus ourselves – and as a result to be transformed from the inside out.

These traditions are: Contemplative: The Prayer-Filled Life; Holiness: The Virtuous Life; Charismatic: The Spirit-Empowered Life; Social Justice: The Compassionate Life; Evangelical: The Word-Centered Life; and Incarnational: The Sacramental Life.

Beginning Wednesday January 24 at 10:00 AM and 6:00 PM (choose which time works for you), we will spend nine weeks exploring these "streams of living water" and learning how these streams can bring us closer to God.



Ron and I have been married for 43 years, we have 4 children, 7 grandchildren, 8 great grandchildren (and a whole bunch of people who call us mom and dad and are very special in our lives.)

It is my great joy to now have 1 grandson and 2 great granddaughters attend church at Cross~Wind with me. We were 5 generations strong in the Methodist church since that day in 1955!

Fun New Year's Facts to Brush up on the Holiday's History!

Over 50 tons of trash are left in Times Square after New Year's Eve celebrations. About 3,000 pounds of that is confetti—that's a lot to clean up!



The confetti dropped in Times Square is holding secret messages. The confetti in Times Square has thousands of people's wishes written on them. In 2015 "wishfetti" became a part of the tradition. People write their wishes for the new year and submit them to the Wish Wall in Times Square (or online) and those wishes are turned into the confetti that falls over the crowd at midnight.

Many Brazilians welcome the New Year at the beach. It is considered good luck to make seven wishes while jumping seven waves — so you can count on a good old New Year's beach party down in Rio de Janeiro!

If you hear plates breaking in Denmark on New Year's Eve, it's considered good luck. The Danes hold a tradition of throwing plates at the front door of family and friends' homes to welcome good fortune for the new year.

ABC's 'New Year's Rockin' Eve' show is a long standing tradition. Dick Clark began hosting the show in 1974. In December 2004, Clark suffered a stroke and Regis Philbin stepped in at the last minute to host. In 2005, Clark officially handed hosting duties over to Ryan Seacrest.

Most New Year's resolutions aren't taken too seriously. Nearly 80% of resolutions made at the beginning of the year are forgotten by February. So no worries if you need to restart!

The first Times Square New Year's party was thrown for a newspaper. The annual tradition of gathering in Times Square for New Year's started as a party to celebrate the opening of the *New York Times* building in 1904. Over 200,000 people attended.

Though the parties raged on, there wasn't a ball drop until 1907. Fireworks were previously used to welcome the new year, but they were banned because burning embers were falling on the crowd. A ball being lowered on a flagpole was a safer bet.



Hershey, PA drops a giant Kiss to ring in the new year. Other Pennsylvania towns have traditions that play off their names. In Mechanicsburg, they drop a wrench. In Dillsburg, they drop a pickle.

The New Year's kiss started with the Romans. Although things got a little friskier back then, ancient Romans are credited with the kissing tradition because of their Saturnalia festival. It was a celebration honoring Saturn, the god of time, where all social norms went out the window. Many of the celebrations influenced the Christmas and New Year's festivities that became the focus when Christianity took over the Roman Empire.


Our next Prayer Meeting will be Tuesday,
